Medina in World War One

More than one hundred years ago, in April 1917, when President Woodrow Wilson asked Congress for a declaration of war "to make the world safe for democracy" his plea had the urgency of a crusade. Astonishingly, several in Congress did not think we would send troops "over there."

We did send troops, two million. Charles Hewes Griesinger was one of more than two dozen from Medina who served. "Chuck," as he was known, had entered Trinity College after graduation from Medina High School in 1916. He left college, eager to volunteer as an ambulance driver. He wanted to join the Lakeside Hospital unit of Cleveland, but they had met their quota. A friend suggested he try the University of Michigan. After induction he was sent to Camp Crane in Allentown, Pennsylvania for training. Young Griesinger was assigned to SSU 62/591.\*

> He left Halifax on September 5, 1917 aboard the RMS Baltic headed for England. General Pershing had sailed on the same ship a few months earlier. Within sight of Liverpool a German torpedo hit the ship. There was damage, requiring the ship to be dry-docked. "It was an exciting few minutes," he recalled in an oral interview.\* When his unit arrived at the French

port of Le Harve, the ambulances were waiting. However, they had to be reassembled, still packed in crates. Griesinger, now twenty years old, was about to begin his adventure as a "gentleman volunteer" in the ambulance corps.



According to the official history of Griesinger's unit, they were initially assigned to the French 4th Division and later transferred to the French 29th Division. It was with the 29th that he saw heavy fighting north of Soissons. According to an oral interview, much of their driving was at night complicated by blackouts. Poison gas was also a severe hazard, making driving without lights even more dangerous while wearing a gas mask. "It was the worst thing of the whole war," Griesinger recalled. In transporting the wounded he noted they could only carry four "hossies" on stretchers and one "blesses" in the passenger seat.

Griesinger's unit remained after the armistice providing some "rehabilitation work" in northern France. Two men in his group died and four were wounded. France awarded the unit the Croix de Guerre with two silver stars for courage. With "occupation" service completed, Chuck set sail for home on the Great Northern, and was discharged on April 29, 1919.

Returning to Medina he joined his father in their business, Griesinger Shoes, and retired in 1954. Charles Hewes Griesinger left a legacy of service to both the nation and his Medina community. He died August 27th, 1992 at the age of 94.

His son, "Charlie" carried the Griesinger name with pride, displaying similar courage. When the shock of Pearl Harbor gripped the nation in 1941, Charles Clark Griesinger enlisted in the Marine Corps facing combat in the Pacific.

The tradition of service is part of many Medina families. So on this Memorial Day, pause for an extra few minutes and remember all who served and are serving, as a tribute for their service and sacrifice.

# **Christmas Decorations**

As is our custom, the Friends provided pine roping and red bows for the Baby Section fencing, pine swags with red bows for the mausoleum doors and pine wreaths with red bows for the chapel doors and the Mears office building doors. This past holiday season, however, the Friends decided to adorn the 1892 sandstone entry gate with wreaths and red bows. We purchased one 48" wreath for the center of the carriageway arch and two 36" wreaths – one for each walkway arch. We did not want to compromise

the stone in any way, so long pieces of cable were attached to each wreath and then once each wreath was hoisted into position, the long cable was then looped around the stone structure and fastened. It worked very well and the wreaths withstood December's snow and wind and, most importantly, our beautiful entry gate stone has no nail or hook holes. The Friends thank Sexton James Hjort and City employee, Tyler Strickland, for the work they did on a very cold morning to get the wreaths hung and for taking them down too.

# Friends Of The Cemetery Celebrate 20 Years

The Friends are celebrating 20 years of existence this year! In 1997 the Medina City Cemetery Commission received \$20,000 from the Letha E. House Foundation and \$2,000 from the City of Medina to have a Master Plan done for Spring Grove Cemetery. One of the recommendations of this Plan was to establish a 501(c)3 organization whose mission would be to advocate for the beautification, maintenance and historic preservation of the two Medina City owned and operated cemeteries – Spring Grove Cemetery and Old Town Graveyard. With that recommendation in mind, Teresa Merkle and Cynthia Szunyog, members of the Medina City Cemetery Commission at that time, sent out invitations to many people to attend a start-up organizational

meeting at the Spring Grove chapel that same

year. There was a good turnout that first day and many of those folks who attended that first meeting and agreed to help form this new organization are still members of the Friends today! None of those who attended that start-up meeting 20 years ago ever dreamed of the future success this organization would enjoy. We thank everyone who has worked so hard and given of their time, talents and funds to make the Friends of the Cemetery the thriving organization it is today!

# **Old Town Graveyard Wrought Iron Fence Damaged**

Unfortunately a motor vehicle accident occurred on February 26, 2017 at South Jefferson and East Liberty Street and the very old (no one knows just how old) Old Town Graveyard wrought iron fence was damaged significantly. The damaged section of fence was transported by the City to Standard Welding where the bends and twists, caused by the accident, were painstakingly straightened out as well as could be done. The section has now been refurbished

and the City has plans to re-do the entire fence by removing sections and transporting them to the garage, grinding off the rust and repainting them. They hope to have the work completed this summer.



## **Mausoleum Gutters**

The Friends of the Cemetery will fund the installation of gutters on the Spring Grove mausoleum at a cost of \$3,900. In 2013 when we had the exterior walls of the mausoleum restored, the stone mason suggested installing gutters to help prevent the splashoff of rain water directly onto the exterior walls. This water has caused discoloration over the years and is very difficult to remove without using harsh chemicals or pressure. We have contracted with Chippewa Roofing to do the work.

# **Spoil Pile Pole Building**

The Friends have hired architect, Tony Cerny, to design a pole building that will cover existing spoil piles behind the new Spring Grove maintenance building. The pole building will be open to the west and will require reinforced poles and anchoring to withstand west winds. There will be vents in the back to allow wind to proceed through. It will be approximately 44' in width, 14' high at the back and 20' high at the front to accommodate City dump trucks. The exterior will be sided to match the maintenance building and will provide a very nice finishing touch to the cemetery maintenance facility.

# Table for Chapel

The Friends have hired Eastwood Furniture, of Medina, to design and build a new oak table for the chapel. This table will replace an oak table the Friends had built several years ago for the chapel. The original table proved to be too cumbersome when cemetery staff had to move it to accommodate a full-size casket at the front of the chapel. The old table is now in use at the Friends office at the Mears building. The new table is smaller and designed to hold flowers, cremains and up to 60" caskets. It is 30" in height and is on casters so that it will be much more easily moved off to the side when full-size caskets are brought in.

# **Tree Planting Project**

Each year, the Friends of the Cemetery and the City of Medina cooperate on a tree planting and/or tree maintenance project in the City cemeteries. This program has been on hold the last two years while the City removed ash trees infested with Emerald Ash Borer. Approximately 25 ash trees at Spring Grove were taken down this past fall. The Friends of the Cemetery purchased 25 new trees to replace the ash trees and funded the installation of them. The City's plan is to diversify the species of trees being planted. The Friends purchased eight Gingko Biloba, six Sunburst Honey Locust, five Ornamental Red Bud, and six White oak from Davis Tree Farm and have contracted with Greenskeepers Lawn Service & Landscaping to do the installation.

# Spring and Summer Planting Regulations

All monuments are permitted a seasonal planting area extending no more than ten inches (10") from the foundation on the burial side of a monument. All decorations, ornaments and flowers must be installed within this area. No bushes or large plants are permitted. Only one (1) shepherd's hook or one (1) potted plant is permitted on a marker. Bulbs make a lovely display in the spring. You might consider planting them at your graves this fall.
